Hi everyone,

The males are still moving all over the place. Typically, more males encounter people because they move around a lot looking for females during the courtship season (spring and late summer/fall). The females, on the other hand, don't move much; they find a place with good thermal shelter and lots of rodents, then they sit, eat, and wait for the males to find them. As a result, the girls don't encounter people nearly as often as males. Late June should be about the end of the spring mating season. I would expect to see male movement slow down in July and August.
